Support for Green Building and Environmental Policies

1. Majorities across party lines have concerns about climate change. It is a top-tier issue for Democrats.
2. There is strong support for many proposals to address climate change including strong bipartisan support for passing laws for more efficient buildings and cars.
3. The Green New Deal finds majority support across party lines but needs to be defined. Republican Regular Fox News viewers respond to consistent opposition rhetoric, and they think differently than the rest of the country.
4. Americans strongly value buying products made in America. More than 6 in 10 say they are willing to pay more for something made in America, but few are willing to pay more than a 10 percent premium.
5. Americans strongly favor funding programs and policies to reduce damage to the climate by making polluters pay and by increasing taxes on the wealthiest one percent.



Majorities across party lines have personal concerns about climate change. Democrats and independents have greater concerns than Republicans.

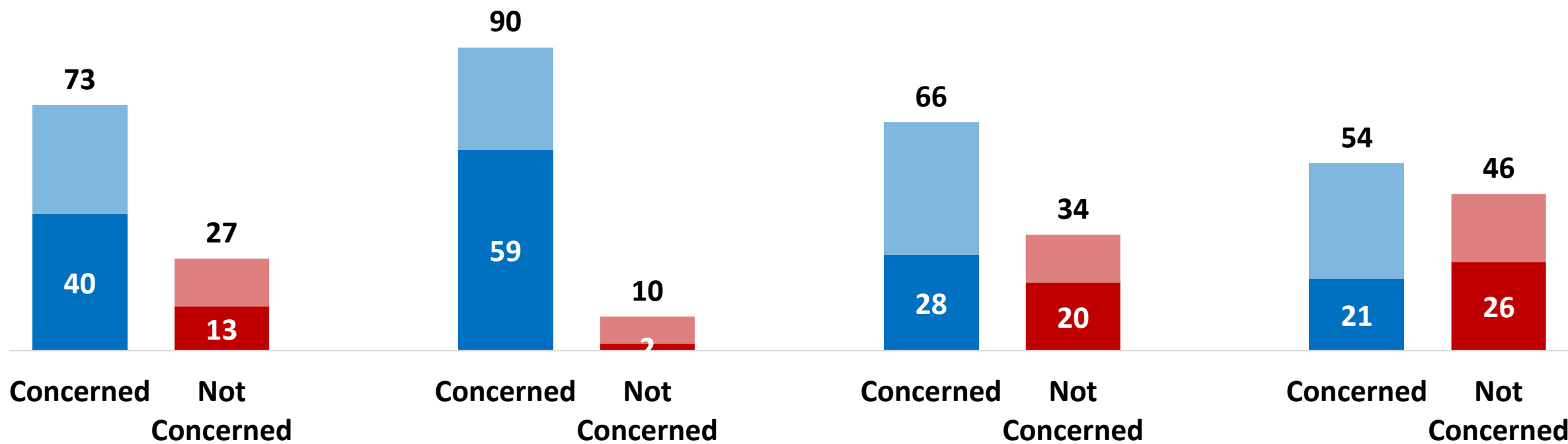
How personally concerned are you about climate change?

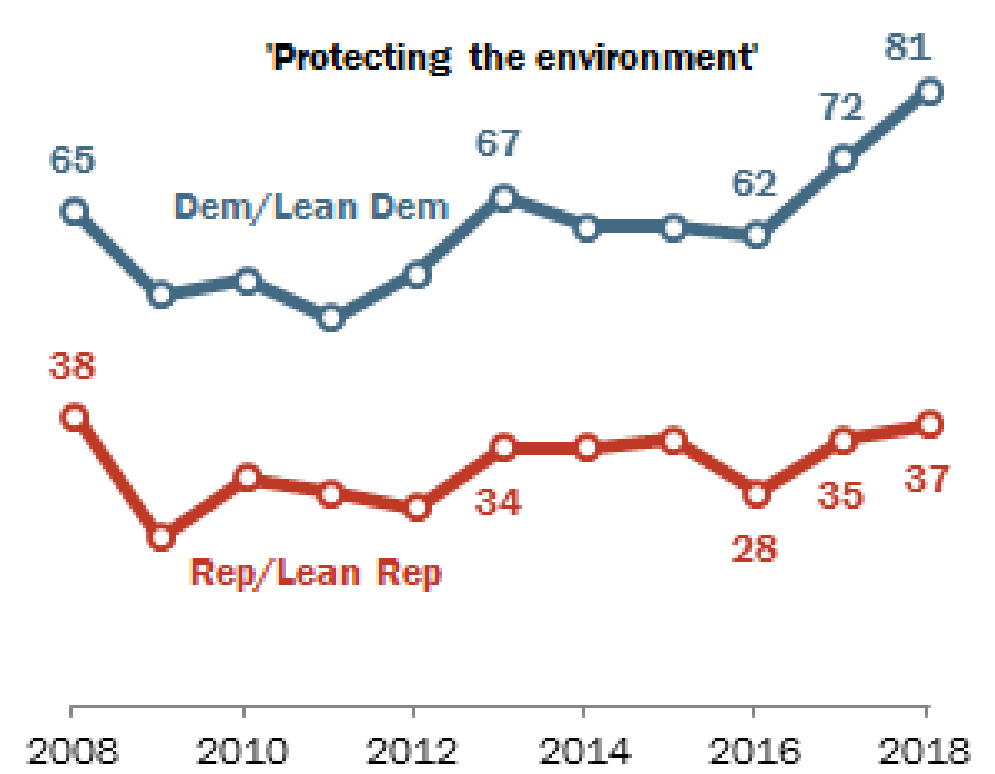
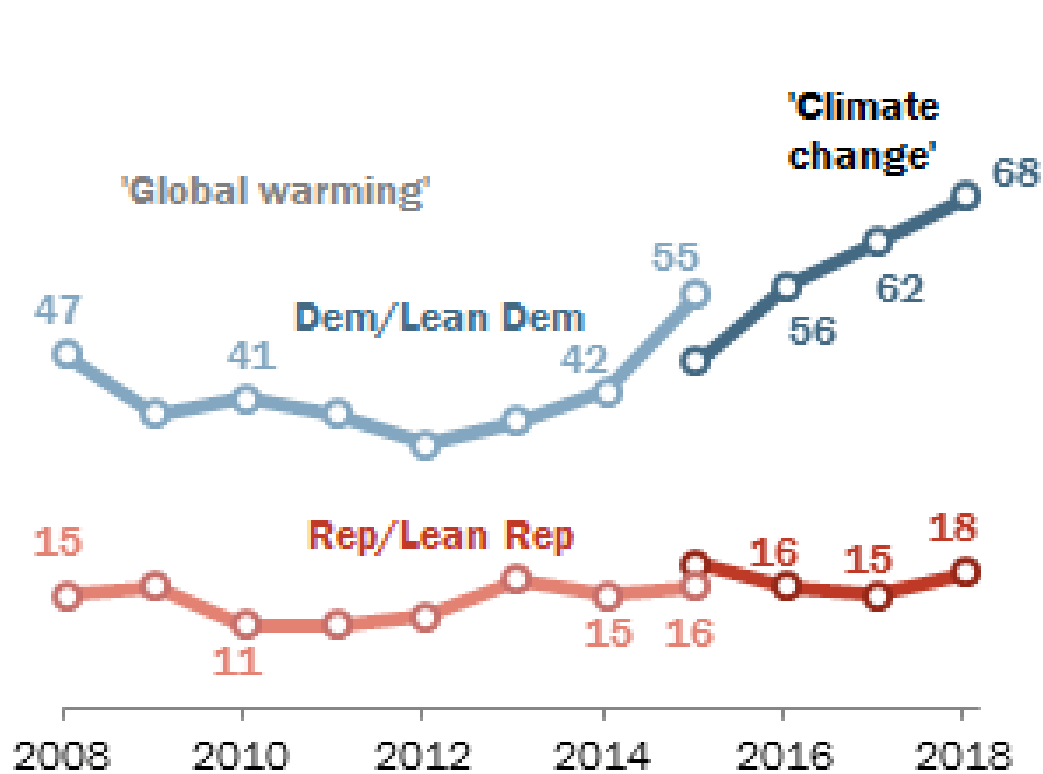

Democrats are increasingly identifying climate change and environmental protection as a top priority.

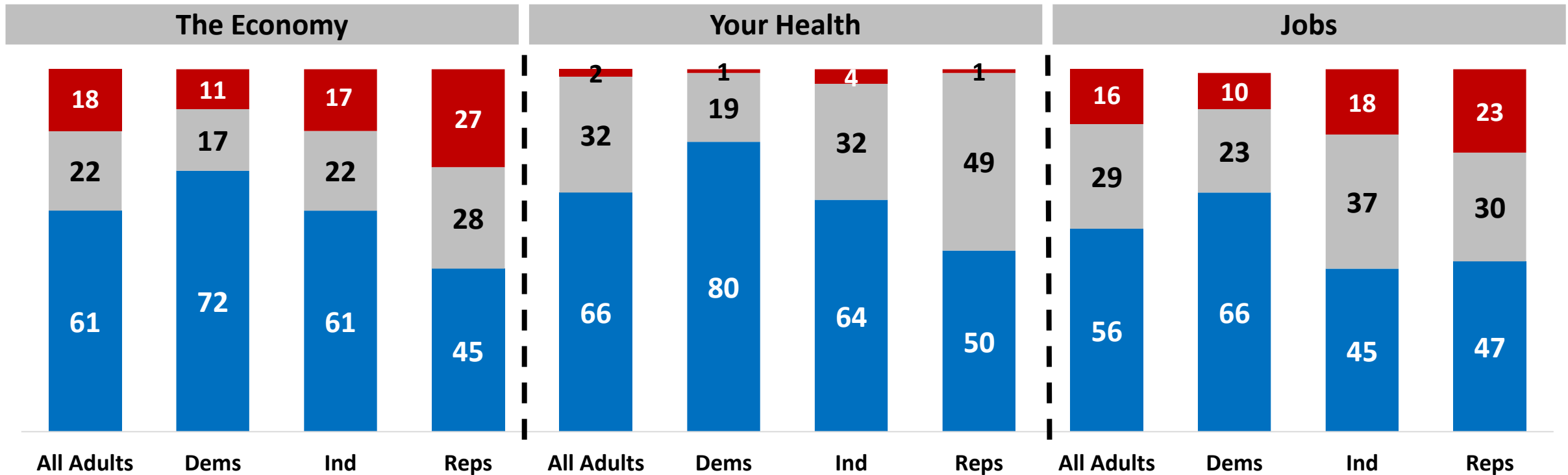
% Who say each is a top priority for the President and Congress (by Party Identification)

If the United States took steps to help prevent future climate change, how would it affect:

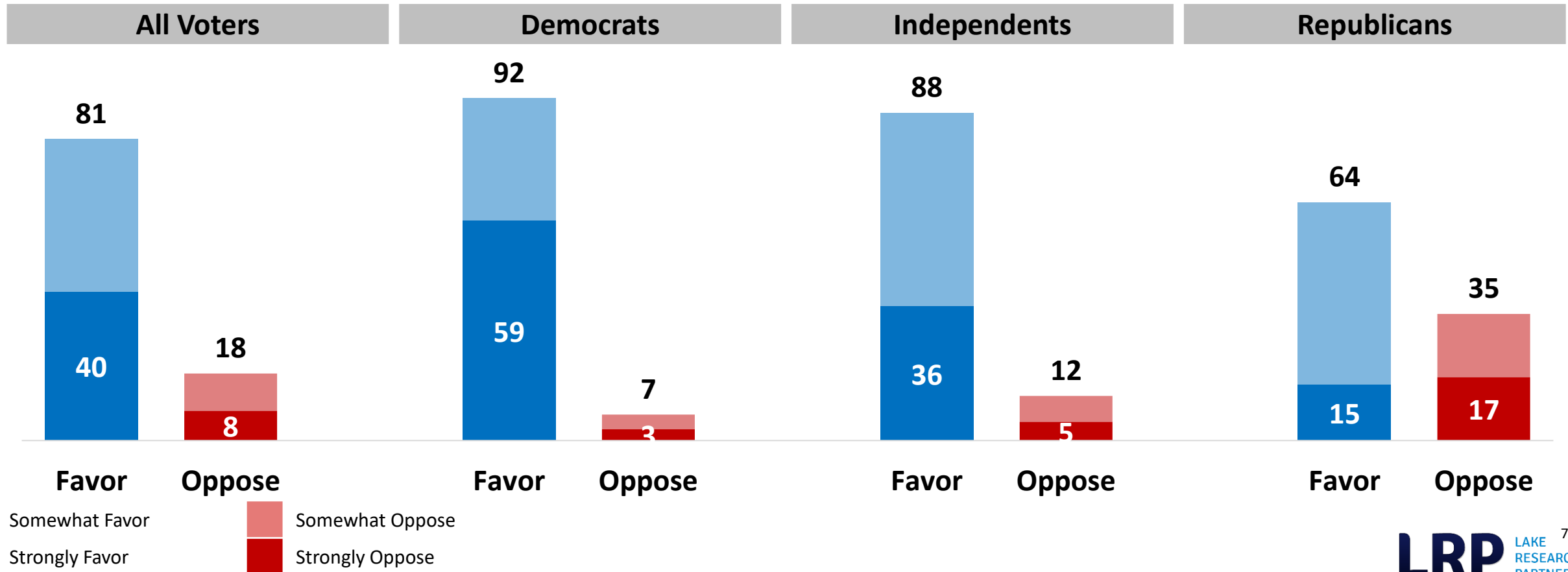


■ Harm economy/Harm Health/Decrease Jobs

Strong majorities across party lines favor a Green New Deal, but it needs to be defined.

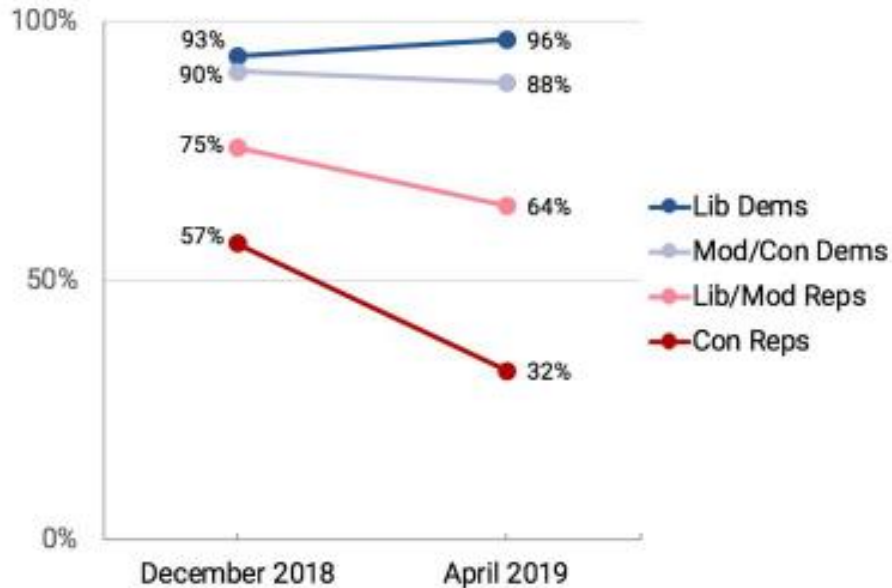
Some members of Congress are proposing a "Green New Deal" for the U.S. They say that a Green New Deal will produce jobs and strengthen America's economy by accelerating the transition from fossil fuels to clean, renewable energy. The Deal would generate 100% of the nation's electricity from clean, renewable sources within the next 10 years; upgrade the nation's energy grid, buildings, and transportation infrastructure; increase energy efficiency; invest in green technology research and development; and provide training for jobs in the new green economy. 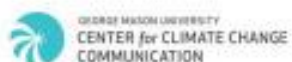
Consistent rhetoric from Fox News against the GND has moved Republican Regular Fox News viewers against the proposal.

Support for the Green New Deal Has Grown More Politically Polarized - % who say "strongly" or "somewhat" support -

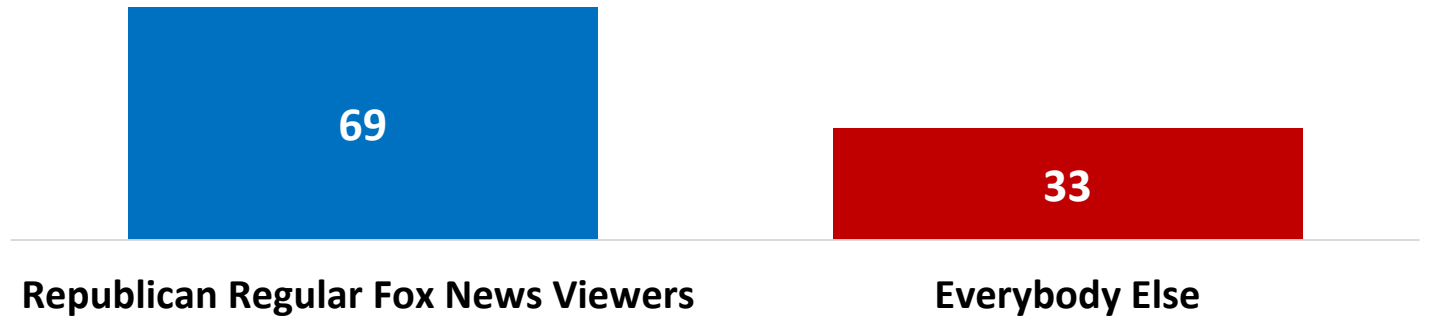

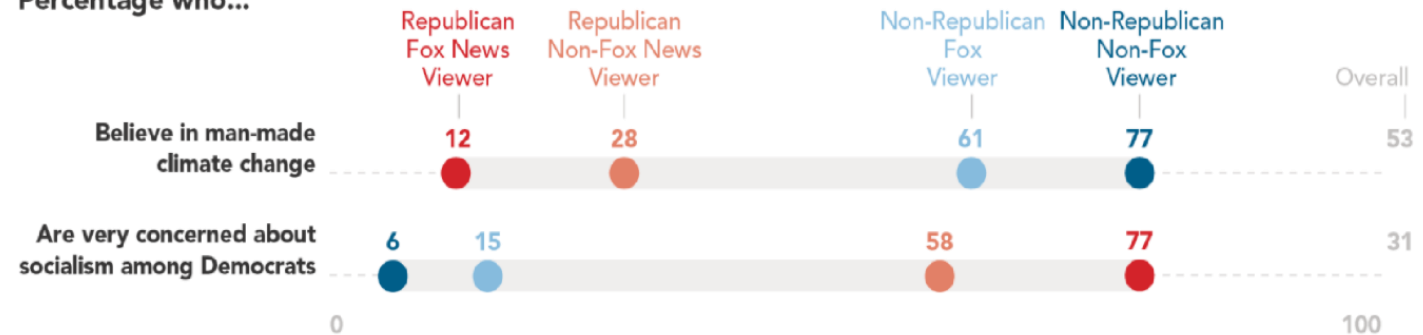

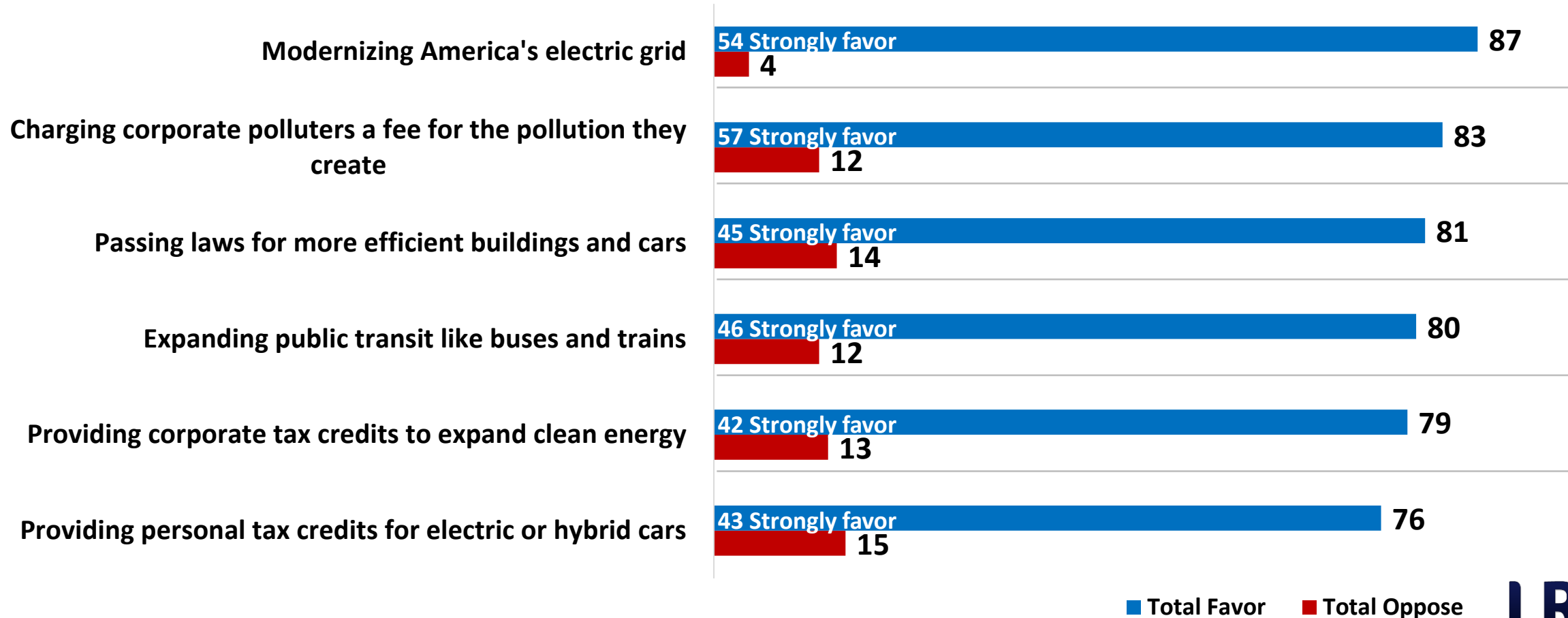

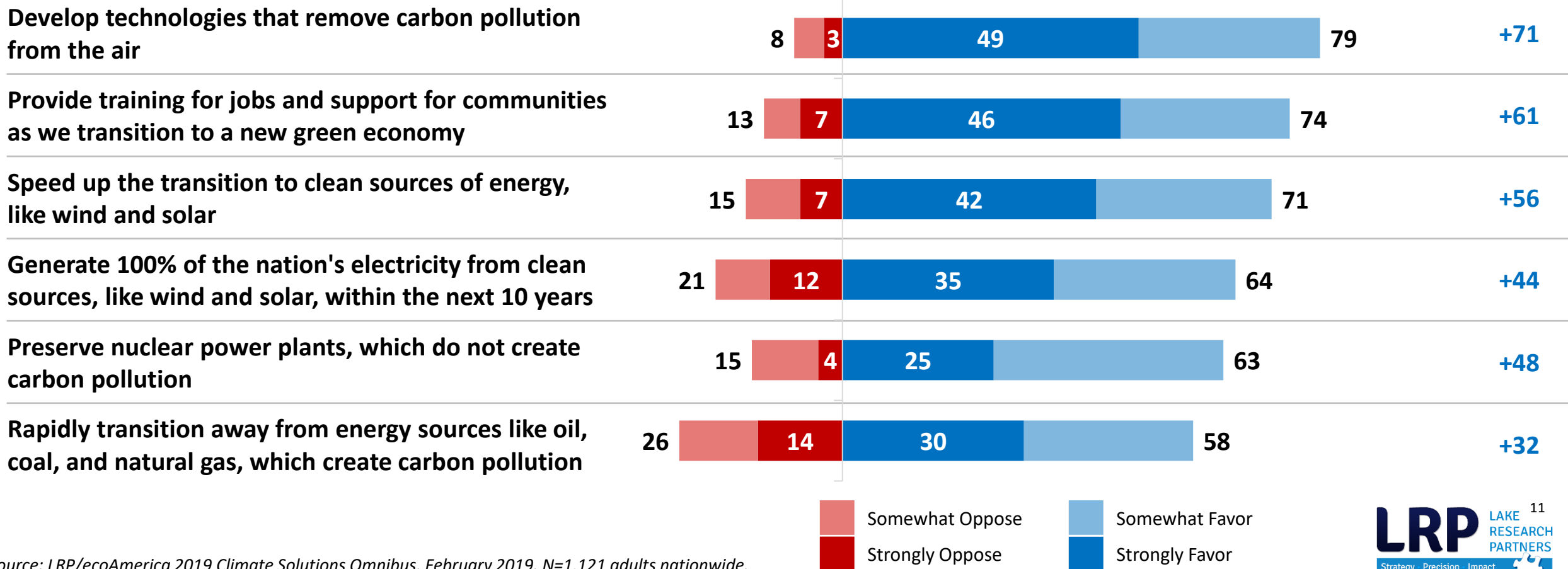
Below are proposals to reduce climate change pollution. Please indicate if you strongly favor, not so strongly favor, not so strongly oppose or strongly oppose each one.

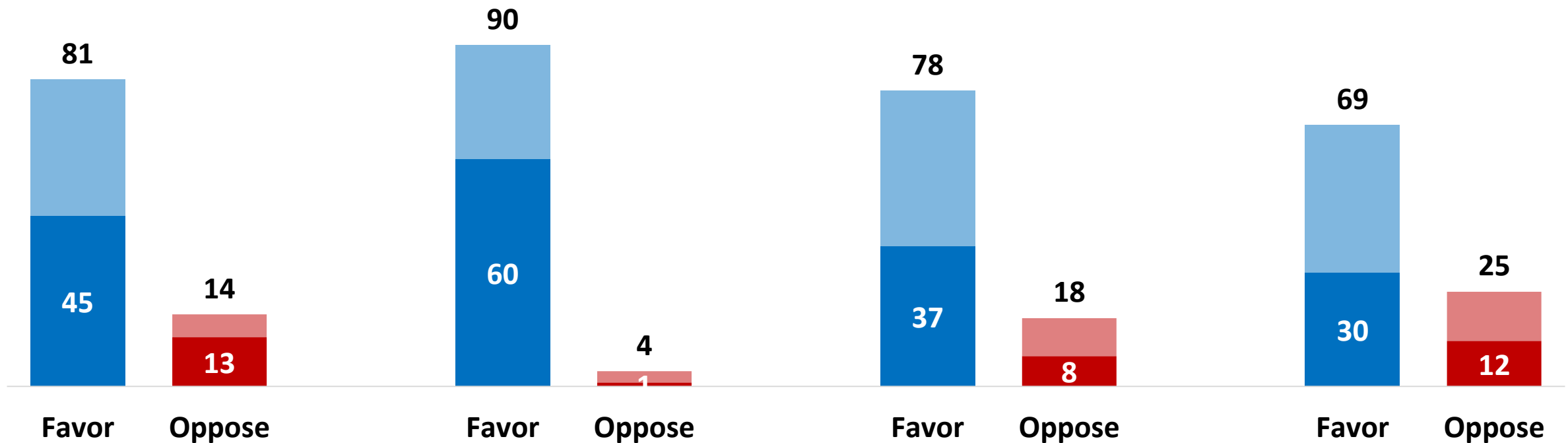

LEED buildings can save people money through cost-effective energy and water use

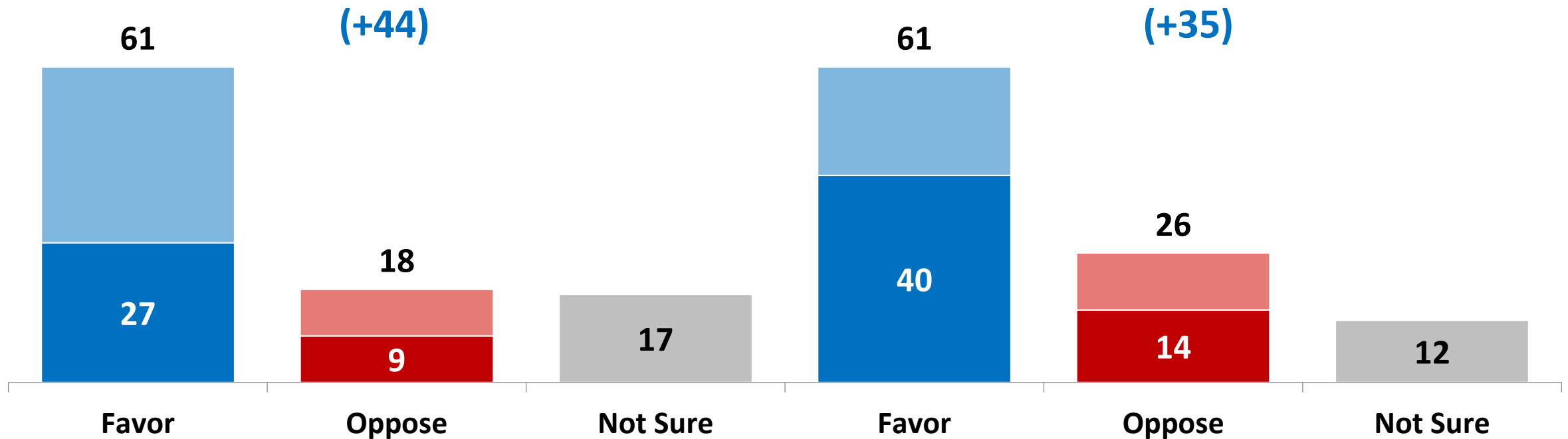

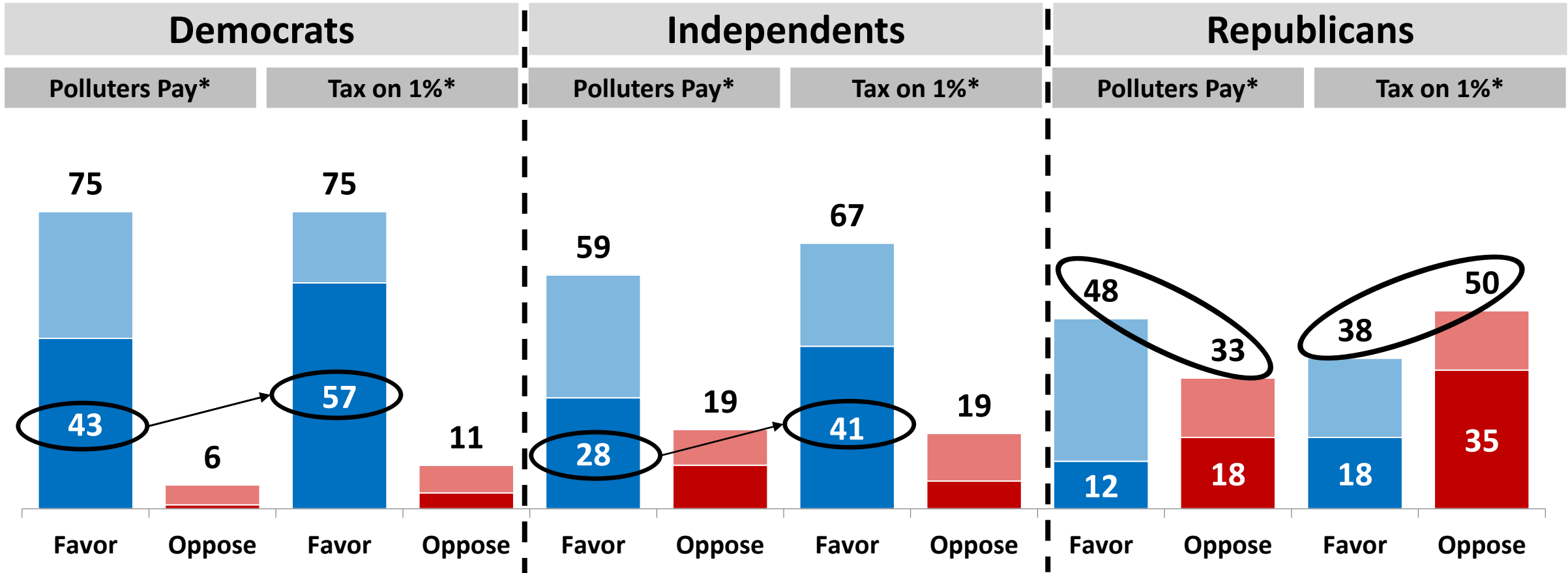

Democrats and independents are more strongly in favor of increasing taxes on the wealthiest one percent, suggesting a galvanizing force behind that approach. However, Republicans oppose increasing taxes on the wealthiest one percent with strong intensity.



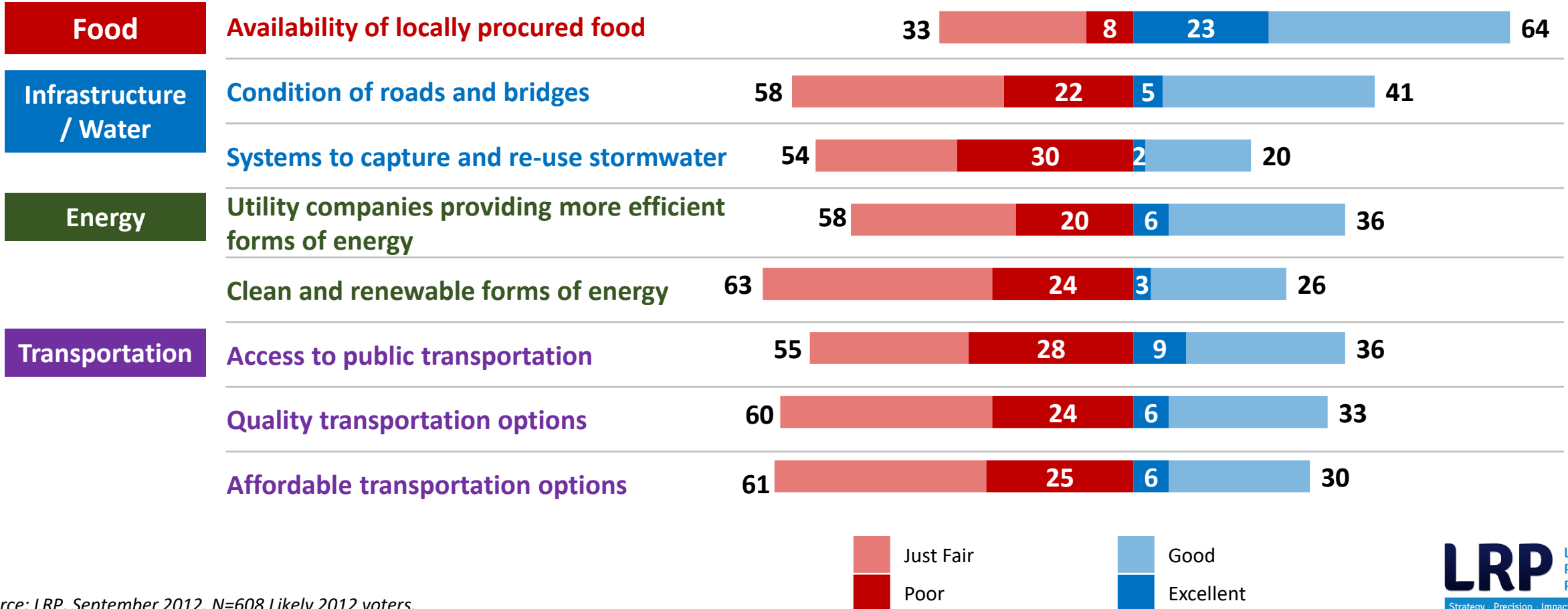

Thinking about the area around where you live, how would you rate:

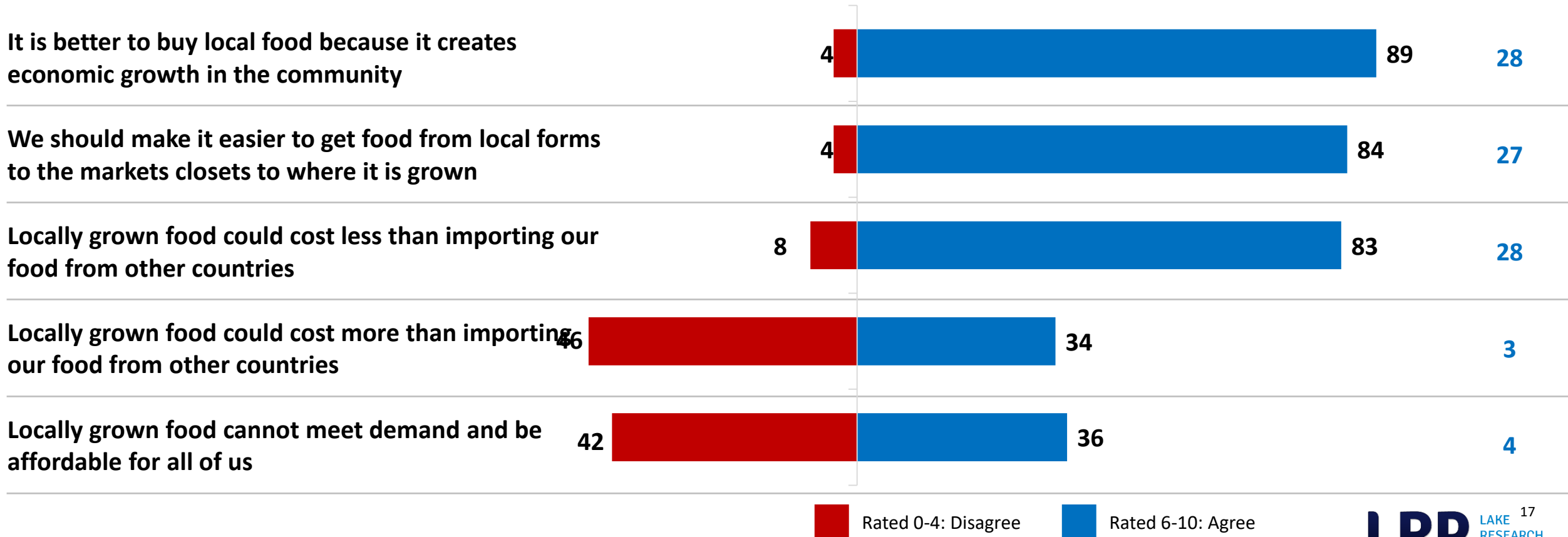

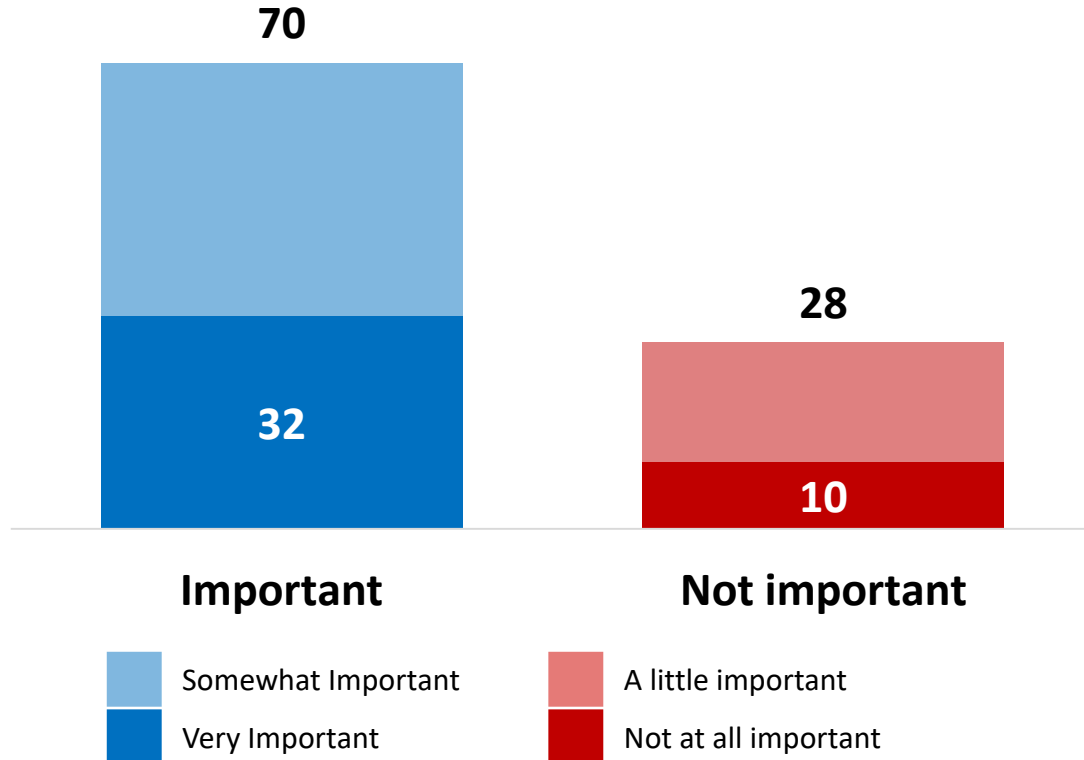

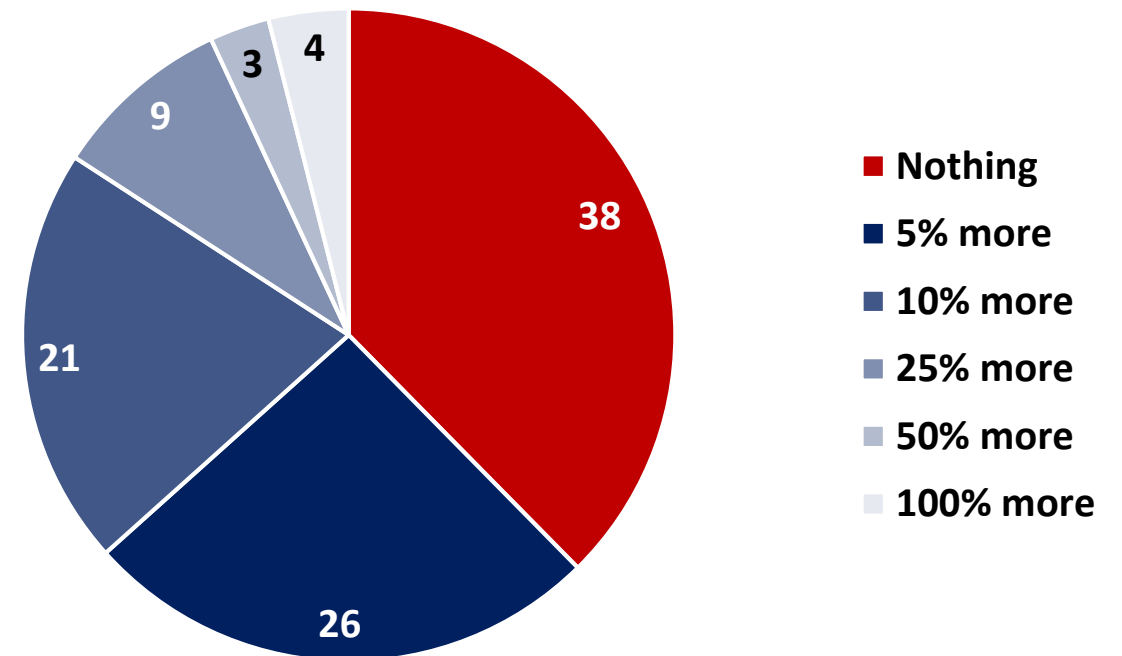

How important is the following when you are buying products... If it is made in the USA?

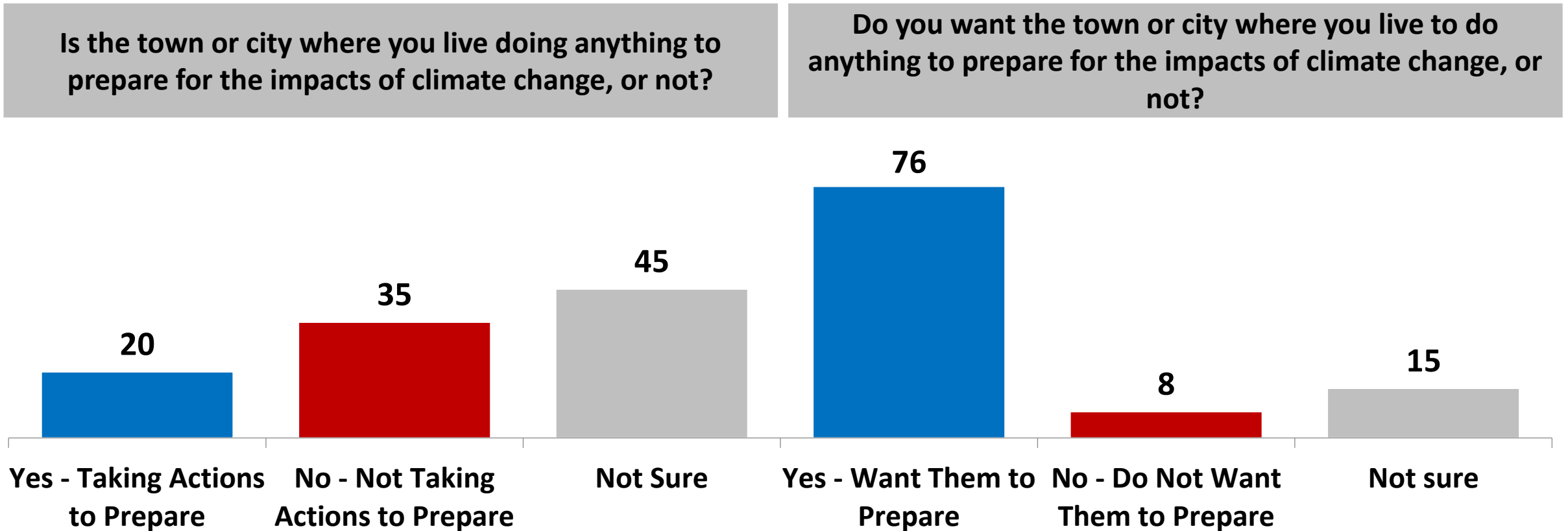


How much extra are you willing to pay for a product that's made in America?



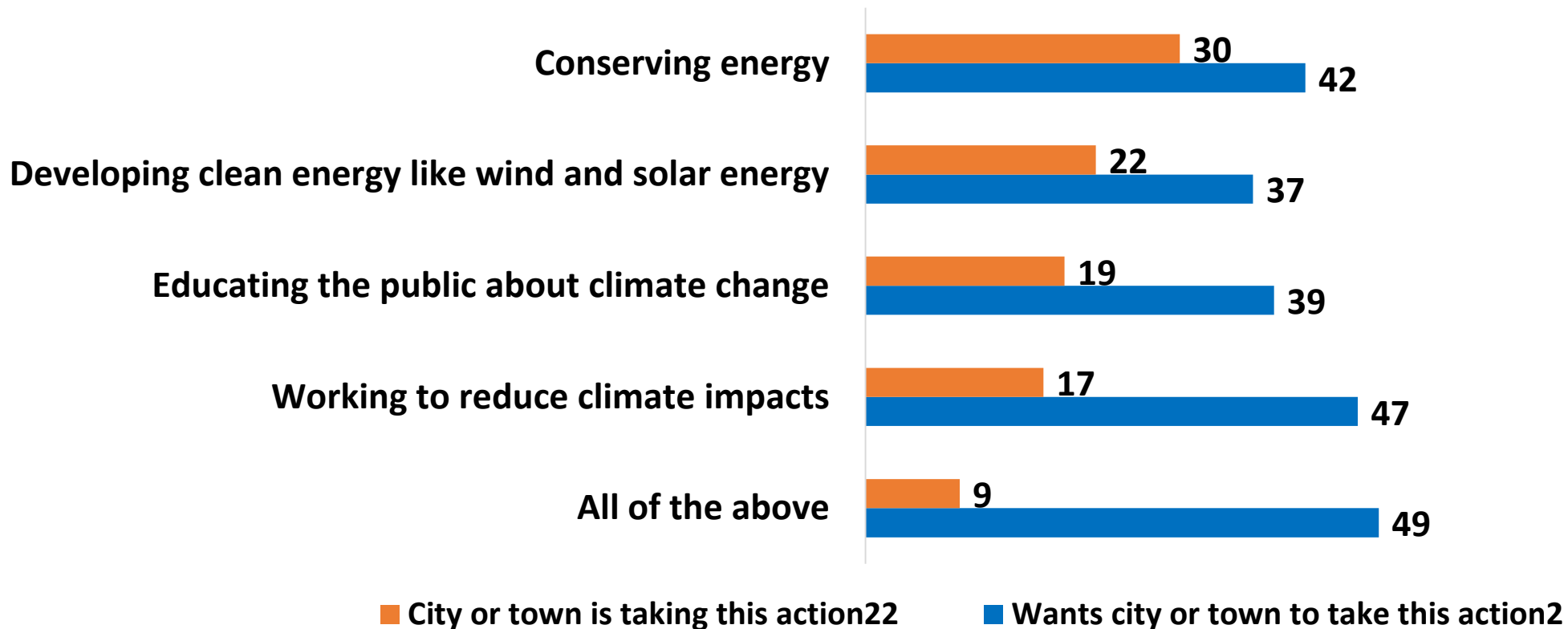
